Everard King - We learned the name from a letter he wrote to Marshall, and the author Arthur Conan Doyle introduced him to us as Marshall's cousin. The interesting thing about Everard is that no one knows how he got rich. Everard himself doesn't want anyone to know this secret. This is also one of the interesting aspects of the story. Everard lives in Greylands Court and this place is his property. He has a unique collection of birds and animals in Greylands Court. It shows that he is a proud and arrogant man. He talks a lot to Marshall about his wealth. In general, Everard is a good host. He takes care of her as best he can, but Everard doesn't like Marshall's house very much. "Now, Tommy, into your cage!"said he" "The "Brazilian cat" is subject only to its owner, Everard. We know this from the fact that as soon as Everard tells it to enter the cage, it obeys the order.

"It pressed its broad, black chest against the bars and angled for me with its crooked paws as I have seen a kitten do before a mouse-trap. It ripped my clothes, but, stretch as it would, it could not quite reach me." 5 In this part of the story, Marshall and the Cat are locked in a cage. The Cat tries to attack Marshall and tears his clothes. Marshall is very scared. But then he overcomes his fear and agrees to die. But the cat can't kill him. Marshall survives because of his agility.

Conclusion. We all know that Arthur Conan Doyle is a very talented and famous writer. Many of his works are loved and read by readers all over the world.
